Literacy

This term we will be covering -

 The basic skills in writing including, capital letters, finger spaces and full stops.

Phonics: Children will continue to work in their phonic groups every morning.

Reading: Children will read twice a week within a guided reading session and will be issued with one book, on a Friday, linked to their reading practise session in school. **Please** ensure that you record any reading sessions at home in the reading record so that we know which books the children have read with you.

Handwriting: Children will continue to form their letters with more precision. We will have at least 3 handwriting sessions per week whereby children will have the time to practise forming their letters.

Speaking, Listening and Drama: There will be lots of opportunity for speaking and listening and drama activities as this encourages good listening and helps to further develop their conversational skills. Speaking and listening is encouraged throughout all elements of the curriculum to help build their confidence and self-esteem. We will be using drama to help immerse the children into our key texts.
