We will continue to try to ensure all classes are on Twitter. The questionnaire format does not allow a comment box under each question but additional comments can be made at the end of the questionnaire. All the staff know their children very well. The children, no matter what ability, are challenged. It may be that homework is not challenging as the majority of homework is revisiting and consolidating the learning from the lesson. We either give too much/not enough or it isn't challenging. Homework is mainly consolidation of learning unless we ask the children to research an area which will be part of their learning in future weeks. Homework increases as the children moves through the school. I feel that it is important not to give too much homework especially in reception as we want to nurture a love of learning and not give children undue anxiety about homework. Children work hard in school, let them enjoy some relaxation time at home. |
| School to be more considerate for working parents: Difficulty in attending meetings/activities at short notice | As a school, we try to give as much notice as possible, which is why there is a long list of dates at the end of every newsletter. Sometimes changes have to be made and we do understand the problem of attending school events at short notice. We understand that not all parents can attend all events and we talk to the children about this. It is important that the children begin to learn that parents cannot always be at every performance/event. |

A few more outings/trips as they seem to have decreased over the years | The cleaning staff and caretaker need time to ensure the rooms are ready for Butterflies and Bugs opening at 7.45am. It is already a long day for children from 7.45 to 5.50 without it being longer. As the school is getting larger we will have to adapt our activities within each year group. Last school year the children in year 1 just sang the songs - and were not part of the performance. If we had each year group giving a performance then Christmas would begin in November which is not the best for young children and it would take up too much time so the children would miss too much of their curriculum learning. All classes do at least 1 and very often 2 sessions of physical activity a week plus the children are involved in the Golden Mile. As a school, we have to fit a lot into the curriculum. Training days are set across Gosforth Schools' Trust so all first schools, GEMS and Central Middle should have the same days. We try to ensure every year group has at least one visit each term. Sometimes due to the topic area it is not possible. We have to take into account the rising costs of visits out of school especially the transport costs so we try to have a mix of visitors to school and visits out of school. |
